Interview with the Special Guest: Javier Grillo-Marxuach

What S / F book(s) have you read so many times that the binding fell apart? <u>The Man In The High Castle</u> by Philip K. Dick, with <u>The Forever War</u> by Joe Haldeman a close second.

What's your favorite (fit to print) memory about working on Lost?

I only realized the true power of *Lost* at the dog park in my Los Angeles neighborhood of Silverlake. I used to take my dog there regularly and got to know the other usual morning visitors pretty well. Among them was a very nice young guy whose dog was dying of cancer. The dog was this majestic, chocolatecolored animal whose undoubtedly once-beautiful body had been ravaged and become bone-thin. One day, when it was clear that this man's companion animal was very much on his last days, I sat with them on one of the benches, and the man told me that he knew his dog was not long for the world, but that he kept bringing him to the dog park because it made the dog happy, even if he couldn't really roughhouse too much with the other dogs. "He's a great dog," the man said to me, and I replied "and he has a great owner." We wept quietly for a while, and then - when that was over - sort of stared at each other awkwardly ... so the man then asked me what I do for a living. I shrugged and said "I write on Lost" - the man's expression immediately turned from absolute grief to absolute fanboy hysteria as he lifted his hands Home Alone style to his face and shouted "OH MY GOD, CAN YOU TELL ME WHAT'S REALLY HAPPENING ON THAT IS-LAND?!"

Why do you think some comics are successful as films, and others are not? The margin for success in any adaptation is extremely narrow. One bad decision casting, a director, a writer's take on the material, the wrong costume, the wrong VFX design - can make any movie go south very quickly. It's easy to armchair quarterback these things after the fact, so I am loath to make too many generalizations. My rule of thumb in getting involved with an adaptation has to do with how much do I need to change it - is it adaptation or is it reinvention? If it's reinvention, it's usually not worth my time - because the final result may not wind up being recognizable to the fans of the original, so what's the point?

What inspired The Middleman? Did it come about in bits and pieces, or did it spring out fully formed?

I came up with the idea in the late nineties, when there were a lot of "freak of the week" shows on the air (*Buffy, Angel, The X-Files, Charmed*, etc.) - I wanted to do a self-aware version of that kind of show that instinctively understood that it existed in a world where everyone knew these things from popular culture. In that initial version, Wendy actually had the same role as Ida... but eventually, I realized that I couldn't just do a show of pop culture references and needed a sympathetic point-of-view character to anchor the thing, so the receptionist character split into Wendy and Ida - wide-eyed apprentice and crotchety enabler. The script came together in 1998, when I was a writer on *Charmed*, in a way, *The Mid-aleman* was my critique of a lot of the genre shows that were on the air that time.

You're walking along the path, and come to a fork in the road. Do you go left or right, and why?

I'll get back to you on that after I roll a D-20 for initiative, do a perception check and make sure the fork isn't booby-trapped.

How did you come to name your dog The Kremlin?

When he was a puppy, he was a lot darker than he is now, so when he would curl up to sleep, he looked like one of those furry hats you used to see on Soviet leaders standing outside The Kremlin in archival footage. Also, his avowed belief in the Dictatorship of the Proletariat.

You wrote Doctor Who / The Middleman crossover fanfic. Are there any other crossovers you think would be fun to write?

I am sure that Rule 34 will pre-empt any attempt I make to wring some humor out of this question.

What's your favorite memory of San Diego Comic Con?

Getting a standing ovation from 1,200 people after the reunited cast of *The Mid- dleman* read the unproduced final script of the series.

What is the most amazing adventure you have yet to experience? I am glad I don't know the answer to this question... as I am probably neurotic enough that I would have already cost-benefit-analyzed myself out of having the adventure by the time it ever showed up. I find that in life and work it's much better to grab on to the safety bar and let the ride be the adventure.
